



## West Africa Infrastructure & Trade Concepts

### Conceptual public overview

West Africa Infrastructure & Trade Concepts explore long-range transportation and trade systems designed to connect communities across West Africa while strengthening ethical trade between Africa and the United States.

At the center of these concepts is a **Trans-African rail corridor** envisioned to run across multiple West African and East African countries, linking inland agricultural regions, coastal ports, and regional trade hubs. The purpose is not only movement of goods, but **movement of opportunity**.

### Scale and Workforce Impact

Preliminary concept modeling indicates that infrastructure development of this scale would support **tens of thousands of local jobs**, with workforce needs estimated at **approximately 56,000 workers across participating countries** during construction phases. These roles would prioritize local hiring, skills training, and long-term workforce development tied to transportation, logistics, maintenance, and operations. Beyond construction, supporting infrastructure—such as logistics hubs, ports, and rail operations—would create **thousands of permanent jobs** in transportation, trade support, and regional services.

### Trade, Agriculture, and Food Exports

A core objective of these concepts is to enable **local agricultural producers to reach international markets more efficiently**. Regions such as **The Gambia and surrounding agricultural corridors** produce rice, mangoes, fisheries products, and other essential goods that often struggle to reach global markets due to fragmented logistics.

Integrated rail and port systems would allow these products to move:

- From inland farms and fisheries
- Through regional rail networks
- To export ports connected directly to U.S. and global markets

This approach supports **local self-sufficiency first**, while creating reliable export pathways that increase income stability for farmers, fishing communities, and cooperatives.

### Regional Connectivity

The corridor concept is designed to **move across the entirety of West Africa**, linking one country to the next rather than isolating development to a single location. By connecting multiple regions into a shared transportation and trade system, the model encourages cooperation, shared standards, and long-term regional growth instead of extractive, single-point projects.

### Community and Economic Outcomes

These concepts are centered on:

- Job creation tied to real infrastructure
- Skills transfer and vocational training
- Ethical trade practices
- Long-term regional resilience

The intention is to support communities so they are **not dependent on aid**, but equipped with infrastructure that allows them to participate fully in regional and international trade on fair terms.





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
